


Red & Bernadette Harris (Unit #6)

At 12:15 while EC folks slowly drifted into the Clubhouse function room, Clubhouse Committee members Ron D'Amato and "What's His Name" — Wayne Anderson — took their positions behind the two preheated barbecue grills located in the outside common area. They were surrounded by coolers holding refrigerated sausages, hot dogs and hamburgers which they immediately began to prepare for serving.

Meanwhile, CC member, Bob Anderson, sold 50/50 raffle tickets while other members Jerry Tirrella, Norm Johnson, and Frank Carey were busy prepping the inside kitchen area. The CC members also warmed up cans of beans, peppers and onions, mixed up 2 large pans of green salad, and got containers of potato salad ready for serving.



They placed high top tables in front of the buffet which were quickly covered with the marvelous sweet desserts voluntarily brought in by EC folks as they arrived. Another table was set up on which hot coffee and water for tea would be offered. Next to that table was placed a large bin that held a variety of iced cold drinks.

By 1:15, pans of barbecued meats were being placed on the serving tables. CC member Frank Carey welcomed everyone, informing all that they could thank **Patsy Chinchillo**, a RE/MAX Encore Realtor, who has been a very good friend of the EC Clubhouse committee and the EC community, for her generosity in covering the cost of this free event and especially the delicious food they were about to enjoy.

To prevent a long line to the kitchen, numbers had been placed on each table. As a number was randomly taken from a basket and called, that table moved to the serving area in the kitchen, (a Social Committee process that we adopted for this event. It worked very well. Thanks SC.)

The rest of the afternoon was spent with everyone just enjoying a home-style barbecue. Neighborhood friends sat around tables, chatting, laughing, and catching up on the local happenings, some making multiple trips to the kitchen for refills.

Cleanup was slow and comfortable. As folks began to leave for home, they brought their folded chairs to one of the storage carts. Some folks took their chairs outside where they formed a circle and continued catching up on each others' activities.



As in the past, the barbecue event was a big, friendly, and casual, EC CC success. We were so glad to see a number of new owners at this event. Hope to see them and many other "newbies" at the next EC committee event.

Ranter or "Screw Your Neighbor"

The title of this article may sound a bit unusual, but the evening of June 24th brought together a group of Emerald Court folks who proved the Social Committee's planned "Ranter" or "Screw Your Neighbor" event was anything but unusual. The 28 participants attending this event was somewhat small, but a friendly, and exuberant atmosphere filled the clubhouse to capacity.

"Ranter" or "Screw Your Neighbor" is actually an easy to play card game and was the evening's main event. However the committee had scheduled an earlier 6:30 start time to the event so as to accommodate the appetizing buffet they had set up for the event's participants. Tables in the kitchen had choices of ham, turkey, and roast beef sandwiches which could be made more delicious by adding one or more of the available lettuce, tomato, and onion toppings. The flavor of each sandwich could also be enhanced by the various condiments offered. Pickles and chips completed the evening's main menu offerings. Mmmm so good! Of course for dessert there were all kinds of cookie options as well as the usual choice of coffee, tea, and water. All of which were made available throughout the evening.

Dining complete, SC Chairperson Peggy Schleicher explained how the game of "Ranter" is played and why it is also called "Screw Your Neighbor".

The game uses a regular 52 deck of cards and each game played requires a personal investment of 3 quarters. After a starting dealer is chosen, each player is dealt one card face-down, after which play begins with the player to the left of the dealer. The object of the game is not to be caught with the lowest valued card among all players. After examining their card, a player may either keep it or exchange it with their neighbor / player on the left. Thus if a player has an ace (Ace = 1) that person would probably want to get rid of it by trading it with his neighbor. ("Screw Your Neighbor")

However if your neighbor has a King (The highest value card), you are blocked and cannot trade. (A bit confusing).



Play proceeds clockwise around the table, with the dealer playing last. Instead of trading cards with someone else, the dealer may exchange his or her card for the top one from the deck.

After all players have taken a turn, they turn their cards face-up and the one with the lowest-valued card loses one quarter which is placed in a center pot dish. If two or more players tie for lowest card, they each lose one quarter to the pot dish.

The deal rotates one position clockwise around the table for each new hand. Players who lose all their quarters are out of the game; the last remaining player wins and collects all the money in the pot.

As always, the goal and purpose of the Social Committee is to try to plan and provide relaxing and entertaining social events that will, hopefully, attract the many folks living in the EC community. This



night's event exemplified again the results of those efforts. Every table was full of chatter and laughter, as well as the sad sound of a woe and giggle when one of the players had been "Screwed by their neighbor".

What a great evening it was. It was wonderful to see some new resident faces in attendance who were welcomed by their neighbors and having a real fun time. Time flew by. People were enjoying themselves so much that clean up was delayed. It seems a few folks were always trying to play, "just one more game." Fun, fun, fun.

Thanks, Social Committee, for a wonderful event. I think "Ranter" is one card game that EC folks may be sharing with their families during the holidays and get-togethers. I know I will. Thanks again for all the effort you put in planning and implementing these monthly popular and fun events.

Even though the evening was a great success, the Committees here at EC are always looking to increase participation at their events. To that point I have included, in this article, the words to a parody of the song "Come to the Cabaret". I hope you read and or sing it, and then consider its message. We'd love to see you at the next committee event.

Writer's Window What are you reading these days?

What's on your bookshelf?

Crime novels? Romance? History? Art? If someone peeked in your window, what would they find? And what would those books say about you? Huh?

Grant Snider puts it another way. He's a cartoonist who has produced a book titled, "I Will Judge You By Your Bookshelf."

The publisher describes it as "a lighthearted collection of one- and two-page comics" in which Snider "explores bookishness in all its forms…"

But enough about Snider. What about you and me?

If you're like me you have more than one shelf. I have thirty shelves in five bookcases in a room that I call the library. (How's that for creativity?) It's where I sit in my recliner, read, do crossword puzzles and fall asleep.

My collection ranges from yellowing paperbacks to hardcover fiction and non-fiction to a set of World Book Encyclopedias (with annual editions through 1984). The encyclopedias were for our children but I still use them occasionally, especially for "research" when doing crossword puzzles.

One question that's often asked of book collectors is, "How do you arrange them on the shelf?"



Some people arrange them alphabetically by author, others by the color of their covers, and some just keep them in piles all over the place.

I arrange fiction alphabetically by authors' last names because that makes it easy to find a particular book I might be looking for. Non-fiction is grouped generally by subject matter – biographies, writing and writers; WWII military history; crime; memoirs; and humor.

So, what do my books say about me?

The yellowing and cracking mass market paperbacks say I used to take the train when I commuted to work in Boston and I'd always bring one to read. I have to weed those out periodically to make room and also because they're falling apart.

Altogether they reflect my taste in authors. It's a long list but some of the names are John McPhee, Irving Wallace, Elmore Leonard, Kurt Vonnegut, Jonathan Franzen, John Cheever, Joan Didion, Stewart O'Nan, Larry McMurtry and on and on. It's an eclectic bunch.



There's also a shelf and a half of books signed by authors including John Hersey, Richard Russo, Robert Stone and Elmore Leonard. Are they valuable? Not likely except maybe for Hersey's limited first edition of "Blues." Even then, not likely worth very much.

I also have a mint-condition copy of Aristotle's "The Republic" that I bought for 50 cents at the Tewksbury library. I've thought of signing it "To my good friend, Jack. Kind regards, Aristotle" and keeping it on that shelf.


Also resting on one bottom shelf is my Remington Standard typewriter, purchased reconditioned for \$84.50 in 1961. I occasionally consider finding a new ribbon and trying to type on it again, just for old times' sake.

The inevitable question is why don't I get books in electronic format? They're less expensive, easy to take on trips, and their illumination makes them easier to read in bed at night. My answer? Between my computer, cellphone and TV, I have more than enough screen time in my life. But more than that, I like the feel of books. I like their looks. I like to be able to flip back and forth in the pages. I like bookmarks!

So, back to the question: What do my books say about me? I suppose they say I enjoy both fiction and non-fiction. I have an interest in writing and writers. And the many books about World War II might suggest I was in the military, which I was. Navy.

But, back to Grant Snider, who says he'd judge you by your bookshelf? If someone were to sneak into your condo unit (certainly not I) and scan your book collection, how would they judge you? Huh?

Or, horrors! Maybe you don't have any books at all.
